Dear Mr. Ferrater,

I am accepting the Fairfield offer (it was raised \$200, incidentally). I enjoyed my visit to Grand Forks, North Dakota; the prairie country is grand and dramatic, and I met a number of interesting people both on the faculty and among the student body. But the University suffers under grave disadvantages which my correspondence with the Department Chairman had not revealed to me; and that Chairman himself has theories about the organization of courses and the like that I found somewhat distasteful and that I had not known about from his letters. So you were absolutely right: only visits to the two campuses ^{could} tell me things I ought to know and put me in a proper position to make my decision.

Thank you again for driving me to Haverford. I enjoyed our conversation enormously. And I am so glad to have heard your paper. I'll have it Xeroxed here this week and get it back to you shortly.

Please remember me to your wife. I did intend calling you at your home Tuesday around 2:30, but that was impossible. I had hoped to speak a moment on the telephone to your wife.

I'll write again soon. I am extremely tired. I returned only yesterday around dinnertime.
