I am delighted that there will be a new edition of your excellent <u>Diccionario</u>, though I commiserate with you for the enormous labor this involves.

My colleague Wilfrid Sellars was born in Ann Arbor, Michigan in 1912. Re N. R. Hanson and R. Montague I would suggest consulting the printed obits published in the APA's annual <u>Proceedings</u>. The living could, of course, simply be written to.

As regards the information you would like about me, it runs as follows: b. Hagen (Germany) 1928; Ph.D. from Princeton in 1951; prof. at Pittsburgh since 1961. I also enclose herewith copies of my vita and most recent list of publications (books only). If I try to put together as briefly as possible a list of my "contributions" it would run somewhat as follows: (1) a coherentist theory of knowledge, which is itself validated by pragmatic considerations; (2) a specifically conceptual idealism — that is, one based on epistemological rather than ontological considerations; (3) a theory of scientific progress based on the technological requirements of scientific inquiry; (4) contributions to various branches of philosophical logic (modal logic, temporal logic, many-valued logic; the theory of plausible reasoning); (5) contributions to the history of plausible reasoning); (5) contributions to the history of logic, especially the modal syllogistic of Aristotle and

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
