Dear Nicholas,

I am sorry to learn about the negative reaction to my paper, but, of course, it is the privilege of editors and referees to accept or reject material as they see it fit. In any case, this unhappy episode, as you call it, needs not diminish at all the cordial relations and friendship between us. I am not the sort of person to make such a thing as rejection of a paper for publication stand in the way of friendship.

The fault may lie in sending a paper which is only a part of a much longer affair; indeed, the paper is a somewhat revised version of Chapter One of a book whose successive chapters deal more in detail with matters scarcely broached upon in my paper. The whole thing may dispel some of your referee's misgivings about excessive generality and lack of argument, but the whole thing is still far from being a whole, so that it may be wise to abstain from making undue claims. After all, I may have been barking up the wrong tree all along.

I have the impression, however, that your referee has misunderstood one point. I am not claiming that linguistic philosophy -- or, more specifically, linguistic philosophy of the Oxonian type -- is a form of idealism. I only claim (or hope that I do) that it may lead to some sort of idealism. Thus, my target is not, properly speaking, linguistic philosophy (for which, believe it or not, I have a great deal of respect) but only some uses to which it may be put. To be sure, if the target proves to be a ghost it may be a waste of time to have any fuss about it, but then all I can say is that I have (unwillingly, or perhaps even reluctantly) succumbed to a temptation much too frequent among all persons who believe that I am one, which is to use that belief as a means to an end. Needless to say, I do not exclude the possibility of having misunderstood your referee's alleged misinterpretation on this one point.

You may rest assured that, as far as I am concerned, our friendship will continue in the face of this episode.
