Dear Professor Ferrater-Mora:

I did not answer your letter of June 10 until now because in it you indicated that you were about to leave for Europe. Now it is my turn: my wife and I are leaving State College on Sept 2 and sailing Sept 9 via the Rotterdam for Paris. I have a Fulbright Research Grant for the year, and will be studying German philosophy. Our address in Paris will be: 6 Rue de Villersexel, Paris 7e. Should you be in Paris during the year, it would give me great pleasure to see you. Just recently, I was asked by the Rockefeller Foundation to apply for a grant in political philosophy for 1961-2. I would be very grateful to you if you would consent to act as a reference for me in this matter. I am enclosing a statement of my purpose for your convenience; permit me to thank you in advance for any inconvenience this request imposes on you. As you can imagine, I am most excited about the possibility of spending two years abroad in study. If you have any suggestions about things to do or people to meet, I would like to have them. I wish that we could have a long talk, about our previous correspondence and other matters, before I go, but this seems impossible. As I said, we leave State College for Cleveland (my family home) on Sept 2, and Cleveland for New York on Sept 8.

I look forward to receiving a copy of your new book, as you mentioned in your letter. I hope you will not mind another long letter about it, when I have been able to study it. Two more articles of mine appeared since I last wrote, but they are both extremely early -- I wrote them four years ago. I enclose a copy of the one which seems to me best to hold up, despite flaws induced by my youthful polemics.

I trust that you enjoyed your summer abroad, and I look forward to hearing from you when you have settled down again and find the time to write. I repeat that any advice you have concerning my studies abroad will be most welcome.

Perhaps we can meet again in Paris.
