Dear Mr. & Mrs. Ferrater.

You will note that <u>two</u> of the appointments listed on the bill were not kept – one was cancelled an hour or two before hand, one not at all. This is insufficient notice, especially in right of the inconvenience I accept in rearranging my day off to save time for Jaime. Jaime is aware of this.

This irresponsibility on Jaime's part is, of course, familiar to the two of you. We have discussed his very difficult behavior with the two of you before. As treatment progresses, I am more and more becoming the recipient of the feeling and attitudes he has had towards <u>you</u>, and therefore he is increasingly treating me in a manner similar to the way he has (and, I assume, still is) treating you.

I go into this because it must be frustrating to you to pay for concept appointments. Actually, although he is <u>physically</u> not here, his <u>absence</u> is <u>part</u> of relationship and therefore a <u>crucial</u> part of the treatment process. It is best left for Jaime and me to task it out between the two of us.

As I said on the phone to Mr. Ferrater, the more you can <u>set limits</u> for Jaime the better. This is <u>one</u> reason why it is essential I <u>be</u> paid for these appointments, and that Jaime <u>know</u> it – it woned be <u>very</u> harmful if it were simply <u>my</u> loss of Jaime showed <u>expect</u> some thing extra from me, and then not appear without letting one know.
