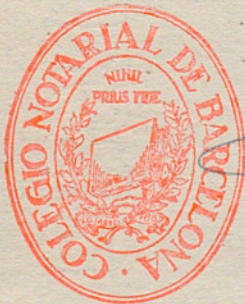

A letter which you wrote to me on April 8th has just been delivered to me by the Post Office here. It was inadequately addressed, as you had directed it to "The Historical Association, London". I do not know why the postal authorities should have taken so long to find us; the Offices of the Association are now at 59a Kennington Park Road, London, S.E.11., and I am surprised that the postal authorities did not immediately send it on to us. But apparently they tried place after place in London, and only now have been able to find us. I hope you will forgive the appearance of discourtesy in my long silence; of course, had the letter reached me earlier, I would have replied at once.

I have seen your leaflet describing the contents of the first three volumes of Estudios De Historia Moderna, and shall be happy, on behalf of the Editorial Board of History, to agree to an interchange between our two periodicals. I suggest that, if you have copies available, the exchange should begin with Vol. I of the Estudios (1951), and with the 1951 volume of History, and should continue until further notice by either side. Please send all exchange copies of your journal to our publishers, Messrs George Philip & Son, Ltd., 32 Fleet Street, London, E.C.4., as they receive all exchange copies on my behalf, and catalogue them for me before sending them on to me. Unless I hear otherwise from you, I will instruct our publishers to send you a copy of each issue of History commencing with February 1951, to the address to which this present letter is directed. I will, however, wait until I hear from you that you are willing to accept the exchange before I take any further steps in the matter.
