Dear José

I presume that by this time Arnold has managed to get [Cerbotlas?] into a furor. If you think it is advisable, you can reassure Claude. As far as I am concerned, we are sticking by the arrangement which you and I discussed with him in April – and which I cleared with Jim McBride:

That he will teach (1969 – 70) on a undergraduate course, on a graduate seminar (both to seen throughout the year) and [...il-legible] seminar of the American Philosophical Society. As for the subject of his seminar, I see no reason to depart from the [...il-legible] he had after going all through the year without a “confrontation” - it was somewhat startling to be faced with “non-negotiable demands” from that quarter two days after Commencement. I am sorry you had to be subjected to it.

It is nice to be between worlds for a few days and I look forward to resuming my parliamentary life in the seventeenth century when we arrive in London on Tuesday. I will leave the twentieth century for you to manage.

I hope you have a profitable and peaceful month and look forward to seeing you in July.
