Dear Mr. Ferrater Mora,

Week before last I learned that Canada would not admit me; two days ago I had a letter from Mr. De Lucca telling me that the University's attempt to induce the immigration officials to reverse their decision about me was not successful. I have mailed off a letter of resignation to the President of the University.

I have talked with Mr. Naha; perhaps something else will turn up. But I have already begun seeking some kind, any kind really, of half-time position in this vicinity.

Despite what I had hoped would be the case, the middle third of my writing has turned out to be a good bit longer than its first third which you have had in your hands for some months. Nothing has gone wrong in itself; everything has actually gone rather well. I have continued to write steadily, and I expect to keep on writing steadily. But I cannot write fast. I hope that you will be able to and willing to look over my second part upon your return to this country. By the time you do return, I hope to have gotten just a little way into the final third.

I hope that you have had a good summer. In particular, I hope that your work at your typewriter has been satisfying.
