Dear Mr. Ferrater Mora,

I have just written off a letter to a Professor George M. Schurr at Box 19, Bennett Hall, the University of Pennsylvania, Philadelphia. Professor Schurr is spending his sabbatical at Penn this year; but he is from a college called Park College (Missouri), and the A. P. A. Committee on Information Service indicates that the College has an appointment in philosophy to make for next year.

I have told him of my being on a replacement appointment here and have asked him to send me further information about the appointment to be made at Park College if he finds my qualifications of interest to him. I need as well--I didn't mention this in my letter--further information about the College itself. I have heard of it, but that is all. It may actually be a very poor place. In any event, through writing to Professor Schurr, I am making a sort of tentative application for the post. And because he is so near you, I have in my letter listed not only your Bryn Mawr College address, but your home telephone. If he should like the sound of my letter, he almost surely would want to talk with you. I didn't give him Leblanc's telephone number, but if he should call you and if you should think he might profitably talk with Leblanc, too, perhaps you would give him the number?

I have not asked you before, but I assume that Mr. Nahm is now back being Department Chairman. Is that right? Well, I know he's back teaching. But you are no longer Acting Chairman? I wish that you were, because it is inconvenient not to be able to list the "Chairman" among those who will write for me. But I can't list Nahm.

By the way, I shall quote here the listing for Park College in the A. P. A. information sheet: "Salary will be \$6500-\$8000, teaching load 9/12 hours (never more than 3 different courses). Candidates should have completed all requirements for the doctorate with the exception of the thesis by next fall. The appointee will teach a Freshman Seminar (15 students), and 3 of the following: Introduction, Logic, Ethics, Phil. of Language, Phil. of Science, Senior Seminar. The appointee may also teach a staff course in the history of ideas (literature, history, and theology). Interest in non-majors is essential, as well as broad interests."
