Dear Professor Mora,

I thank you for your letter which came in yesterday and for your appreciation of what I said about your book, 'Philosophy Today'. I have since finished reading it; and later on I would like to have a bedside copy myself. I have just completed "Levels of knowing and Existence" on general semantics by Mr. H.L. Weinberg. Parts of the book were interesting. At the moment, 'American thought' by Morris R. Cohen is in my hands. Could you please recommend some preliminary books of philosophy, which I would try to find here in the library and study on my own until I get into a University.

Now concerning my plans –you could not be wrong with what you saw- that my purpose would be to enter an undergraduate school in the U.S. provided the necessary financial help be obtained.

You know Professor, in September 1961 and 1962 I was supposed to have begun university studies at the Universities of New Brunswick, Canada, and Trinity University, Texas. But I lacked the financial support and dropped out. Though I registered in those two schools I was going to do pre-med.

I would therefore be very pleased to see how you could help me by any means to an undergraduate school.

You spelt my name quite correctly; and you need not have apologised for any wrong spelling because I sometimes hardly could read my own hand. Did you find it too straining to read my hand writing?

Thanks very much and could suggest, as a young man, interested in the hope of a peaceful world, that you laborate into a book from the practical suggestion you made in that part of the "Philosophy Today" which I quoted in my first letter. At least if you so find it needful and purposeful, I am extremely interested in an international, personal and PRACTICAL, good relations between man 'B' and man 'O'
